As fast as the flowers are blooming, outdoor spring projects are as well. Please remember if you are making any outside improvements that require a permit, please call City Hall for information.

The parking project on Gatehouse Lane is near completion. This will certainly provide better drainage of water, and a safer way for folks to park while using the playground and park. Along with this, our road paving is to begin asap.

This past month, there have been some traffic issues that must be addressed.

First, it is illegal to park on the wrong side of the road facing traffic. Considering that some of our streets are narrow, this has caused significant problems, especially at night.

Second, No stopping of a vehicle within 30 feet of the stop sign.

## "Branching Out" from the Douglass Hills Tree Committee

Mulch—it's not just the "finishing touch" to beautiful landscaping; mulching helps with moisture and weed control.

Here's a few "rules" for optimal results;

- 1. Rake the old mulch to aerate and assess the depth of your mulch. You only need 2-4 inches so it's possible that you don't have to add more!
- 2. Mix up the type of mulch you use. Continued use of the same mulch can negatively impact the soil's nutrients. Organic mulch is always soil enhancing.
- 3. Don't mulch directly up the trunk of a tree. If your mulch resembles a volcano, rearrange it so there is an inch or two of space around the tree trunk.

Interestingly, trees don't require a lot of care once established. Mostly they don't even ask for fertilizer because they are clever enough to get the nutrients needed from the soil. However, if your tree looks sick, take a sample of soil and/or tree tissue to our Extension Office; 4200 Gardiner View Avenue. Their testing will direct you to the correct action and fertilization formulas needed for nursing your tree to health.

For the 2023 pool season ALL Pass purchasers (Both Season Pass and Daily Pass) must purchase an access pass from Douglass Hills City Hall prior to arriving at the pool. Douglass Hills will be using Memberment software to administer pool access for ALL pool patrons. Season Pass administration in Memberment will remain unchanged from last season. To ensure compliance with health department guidelines, all pool patrons will be required to submit minimum contact information defined as name, address, birthdate, phone#, and emergency contact & phone#. Daily Pass purchasers must make initial purchase in person at Douglass Hills City Hall to capture photo and establish a Memberment account. Memberment accounts can purchase an unlimited number of daily passes; however, an account member with photo on file must be present to redeem passes at the pool gate. The Memberment account holder is responsible for the behavior of All Guest patrons admitted under their account. Failure to comply with posted pool rules may result in the exclusion of patrons from purchasing or using additional passes without refund. Once Memberment account is established, additional daily passes may be purchased in person or by calling Douglass Hills City Hall. Daily Pass sales can be made during regular business hours. Additional purchase times outside of regular business hours will be made available and communicated on the city's website noted above.

A Kentuckian through and through, James J. Douglas was born in 1846 to parents who were native Kentuckians. The public record says little of Douglas' early years. It is documented that he settled in Louisville and was engaged in the whiskey trade, a leading industry of the city. In 1886 after many years in apprenticeship to other whiskey men, Douglas struck out on his own. He created a wholesale liquor business in Louisville and called his firm, J.J. Douglas Co.

In 1879 he married Ella K., a Kentucky-born woman. They had no children.

In 1896 Douglas moved from Louisville to the nearby village of Middletown. There he bought a 300-acre estate from the widow of a Louisville tobacco merchant who had established it as a horse farm. Douglass died in 1917 and his property became known as Douglass Place and later Douglass Hills.

## WE'VE DUG UP SOME HELPFUL INFORMATION FOR YOU ABOUT DIGGING



It's the time of year when there's a "hole" lotta diggin' goin' on. Maybe it's flowers. Or a bush. Could be a new mailbox. Whatever it is, before you do anything else, be sure to contact 811 at least two business days before your project begins if it requires digging. Go to **kentucky811.org** or call **811** to request that utilities, including LG&E, mark any underground

lines (electric, gas, water, cable, etc.) on your property.

April is National Safe Digging Month, and contacting 811 will help you avoid hitting an underground line. Otherwise, you run the risk of a major repair bill and/or a serious injury or possibly even death. Remember, contacting 811 is the law, and there is no charge for the service.

#### **Private lines**

Please note that some underground lines will **NOT** be marked by 811. These are private lines such as electric or water lines to a pool, lines to septic tanks, electric lines to sheds or landscape lighting,

lawn sprinkler systems, invisible pet fencing, etc. A good general rule of thumb is if the utility runs from the street to the meter, it will be marked. If the utility is installed from the meter to another location on your property, it will not be marked. It is the property owner's responsibility to contact a private locating company. Visit **kentucky811.org/homeowners/myutilities** for more information regarding private lines and companies that will locate them for you for a fee.

If a natural gas line is damaged during excavation, the Kentucky Public Service Commission (KPSC) will investigate to determine if the line was properly marked. If it wasn't, you could be charged a hefty fine. Visit **Ige-ku.com/811** to learn more.

#### Planting trees

From looking down to looking up ... if you are planting a tree, make sure it's the right tree in the right place. You want to avoid interference with overhead power lines, so – before you put it in the ground – take the time to learn how tall your tree will be when it matures. # A LITTLE VIGILANCE CAN HELP PREVENT A NATURAL GAS EMERGENCY



Natural gas is an extremely safe and reliable energy source that more than 333,000 LG&E customers rely on. But like just about anything else, it's a good idea to keep an eye out for anything that could cause an emergency.

Examples include:

- A loose or bad connection on a gas appliance.
- A pilot light that is malfunctioning.
- A gas line that gets damaged by digging.

If you ever suspect you have a natural gas leak, **leave the area immediately**. Once you are away from your home, call us at **502-589-1444** (**800-331-7370** outside Louisville) and press 1-1-1.

Also call **911** to contact emergency officials. Never report a gas leak by email.

And it's important to remember to avoid doing anything that could cause a spark, such as:

- Using a cellphone or landline phone (only call us after you leave the area).
- Flipping a light switch.
- Unplugging an appliance.
- Using a garage door opener.
- Starting a car.

# IT'S TIME TO TALK ABOUT THE BIRDS AND THE BEES (AND THE FLOWERS AND THE SHRUBS)



Pollinator habitats are very important to the environment and agricultural systems. They reduce water runoff and soil erosion. They lessen the need for maintenance, saving money. And, of course, they beautify the area.

Pollinators such as honeybees, monarch butterflies and a variety of birds depend on flowers for pollen and nectar. That's why we are establishing – or in some cases have already established – several pollinator habitats across our service territories.

And here's more good news ... anyone can create a pollinator habitat.

Plant flowers, grasses, trees and shrubs native to your area.
 Visit nwf.org/nativeplantfinder/plants to help you get started.

- Fill a birdbath with gravel or create a muddy patch in a corner of your yard so pollinators have a shallow place to drink water.
- Weed and water your habitat as needed.
- Cluster plantings close together. This provides pollinators shelter and camouflage from predators.
