#### **MAYOR'S MESSAGE...**

The 2023-2024 balanced budget is presented with cuts in nearly every category, except for the categories that are beyond the control of the city.

#### **ADMINISTRATION**

There's an increase of \$15,029 which is largely due to upgrading and securing our technology. This increase includes website, IT and cyber security.

#### GENERAL GOVERNMENT

We were able to keep the general government account the same as before. This includes an extra \$5,000 in legal fees for upcoming developments and general legal work.

#### **PUBLIC SAFETY**

There was a decrease of \$500 in the public safety category.

#### **ROADS**

This category continues to fluctuate because of the amount of road funding received from the state to cities. The 1947 road formula continues to be unequal, even though the road structures and needs of urban vs suburban transportation simply do not work with the travels of today.

Until the Kentucky legislature also adds fees to new electric/hybrid vehicles, our allotment of funding will remain stagnant or decrease.

In order to continue to keep our roads and sidewalks up to date and safe, we have added \$68,065 to the road fund from our general fund.

We decreased our traffic signs repairs by \$15,000 considering we upgraded our stop signs to more reflective ones which was federal mandated. In total, the road category increased by \$50,065.

#### **SANITATION**

This category was increased by \$18,000. This is to cover fuel cost and extra city services, dumpsters after storms, dumpsters for holiday wrappings, extra pickups and compost.

#### **PUBLIC WORKS**

The largest category of the budget is for the public works. Within this category, there's an increase of \$52,910. This portion of the budget is that is still directly affected by the Covid pandemic. The building and service industries have yet to even slightly decrease the cost of goods and materials.

Even though we decreased the amounts spent in common areas (\$25,000), playground equipment (\$10,000), public works assets (\$11,000) and entrances (\$30,000), we increased our entertainment in the park by \$23,000. This amount is to pay for our entertainment director, and our 50th birthday party, as well as new seasonal events that citizens have asked for. Because of the maturity of our trees and continued maintenance in both our parks, we increased the park maintenance and improvements by \$20,000.

### "Branching Out" from the Douglass Hills Tree Committee

**Japanese Zelkova** - not a common tree name that rolls off the tongue. Yet, it is an excellent tree for your Kentucky landscape. It is also known as Green Vase Zelkova which harkens to its vase-like shape formed by its upright branches.



It is a tall tree (a relative of the elm) and at maturity reaches 70 feet tall with a spread of 50 feet and can live up to 70 years. Because it is low maintenance with a noninvasive taproot system, it is ideal for street plantings void of power lines or in larger landscape settings.

This is a fast-growing tree that thrives in full sunlight. Because it tolerates most soil types (except sand) it is fairly easy to grow. Additionally the trees withstand most drought conditions and are wind tolerant when properly pruned (which should occur in later winter after all extreme winter weather ends.) It is fairly disease resistant and worth your further investigation if you are looking for a unique tree. Young trees are susceptible to frost, so spring is an ideal time for planting.

As far as its appearance, you can expect summer shade and beautiful fall copper hues with this low maintenance tree.

# ORDINANCE NO. 5 , SERIES 2023 AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING AN OPERATING BUDGET AND ALLOCATING FUNDS FOR JULY 1, 2023 THROUGH JUNE 30, 2024

WHEREAS, pursuant to provisions of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, and in the interest of sound fiscal planning, the City of Douglass Hills is empowered to adopt an operating budget;

## NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DOUGLASS HILLS, KENTUCKY:

Section 1: That the annual budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2024 is hereby adopted as follows:

## **BBB SCAM ALERT**: Fraudulent QR codes continue to be used in a variety of scams

The use of QR codes presents an opportunity for businesses to direct current or potential customers to their websites. Consumer reports to BBB and warnings issued by police departments detail how some QR codes direct users to phishing websites, fraudulent payment portals, and downloads that infect devices with viruses or malware.

Here are some recent ways scammers are using QR codes:

<u>Parking meter payment</u>. Fraudulent QR codes are placed backs of parking meters, leading victims to pay for parking through the QR code. Con artists create a QR codes for free online, which they print on stickers and place where it makes sense.

<u>Cryptocurrency</u> wallets and romance scams. Recently, BBB has become aware of scammers who spend months building a romantic relationship with their victim, which ultimately results in them asking for financial assistance

through a cryptocurrency exchange or 'advising' the victim on cryptocurrency investment.

<u>Phishing scams</u>. The design of QR codes makes it impossible for the user to know where the code will direct them after scanning, allowing scammers to send victims to phishing websites or downloads that will infect devices with malware.

<u>Utility and government impostors</u>. Many consumers report their utility company contacts them, the Social Security Administration, or the IRS regarding an outstanding debt they must immediately pay in full. The payment portal the victim is directed to often mimics the real portal down to the finest detail, providing a false sense of security that it is legitimate.

<u>False sense of security</u>. Reports to Better Business Bureau and additional screenshots, emails, and texts detail how scammers include a legitimate QR code for the company or entity they claim to represent to give victims a false sense of security.

Gwinn-Villaroel spent 24 years with the Atlanta PD, beginning in 1997 as a patrol officer and serving in numerous capacities including detective, sergeant, lieutenant and captain. In 2020, she was promoted to commander of the Atlanta PD's Training Academy before joining LMPD as deputy chief in 2021. In seven months as interim chief, she launched the department's first nonfatal shooting unit, expanded the successful Crisis Call Diversion Program and opened the new LMPD Officer Wellness Center. She also created the new narcotics tip line and worked with the Office of Inspector General on an agreement to promote transparency and accountability in OIG investigations. "Louisville has welcomed me with open arms, and I am honored to be the leader of our police department," Gwinn-Villaroel said. "My team and I are dedicated to building trust between LMPD and the people of this city through community policing, transparency and accountability. And to the LMPD officers who dedicate their lives to public service every day: Thank you for your hard work and sacrifice. 


