"Branching Out" from the Douglass Hills Tree Committee

Black Gum Trees have some surprising attributes. Noteworthy is that it can live up to 700 years and this tree does not drop those spiky balls (that's the sweet gum tree.) Because it has a deep root system versus a spreading set of roots, planting along streets and driveways is ideal. It is perfect for yards too because the trunk grows straight with branches that grow at nearly perfect right angles that rarely cross each other, therefore, it is a heautifully shaped tree with little branch breakage. It loves full sup-

cross each other, therefore, it is a beautifully shaped tree with little branch breakage. It loves full sun, but will perform in partial sun and is not picky about soil.

The black gum produces flowers in the late spring/early summer that are small and white in color. These flowers attract bees so it is considered one of the best "honey-producing" trees in the world. Too, the tree's flowers are not messy and often overlooked even if they do fall to the ground. The female flowers and perfect flowers (have both male and female parts) produce fruit in late summer/early fall that attract multiple birds! The leaves are a stand out because parts turn red in August and eventually the entire tree is a scarlet stunner. Its earlier fall transformation is believed to highlight its fruit as a food source for wildlife.

Black gum trees are slow growing and young black gum trees are a delicacy for deer, therefore, will need protection until they mature. Deer no longer like the taste of mature leaves. The very strong bark will eventually grow hollows that will not impact its longevity, but will offer shelter to owls, bats, and other wildlife.

HERE FOR HELP WITH YOUR BILL IF AND WHEN YOU NEED IT



Do you need help paying your energy bill? There are a number of utility bill assistance programs that provide income-eligible customers support, and we encourage customers to take advantage of these programs. Programs include

LIHEAP (Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program), LIHEAP Crisis, assistance through various local agencies and LG&E Winterhelp. Winterhelp is a nonprofit made up of agencies that provide emergency heating assistance from January through March for low-income households in crisis that are without heat or are in immediate danger of being without heat.

WANT TO HELP OTHERS?

If you want to help fellow customers, donate to LG&E Winterhelp. Customers' donations are matched by LG&E year-round, so more money is available for heating assistance. You can donate as often as you like – one time, with a couple payments or every month. LG&E forwards the donation and match directly to the agencies that administer the funds.

LG&E has no role in assessing who is eligible for assistance.

WE LIKE TO SEE YOUR METER OUT IN THE GREAT WIDE OPEN

When you receive your LG&E bill each month, you want to be confident it's accurate. We work very hard to make sure that's the case, but we can use your help. Making sure your meter is easily accessible for our technicians to read each month goes a long way toward ensuring the accuracy of your bill. There should be no vegetation or other blockage at least six feet in front of your meter and within two feet on either side. Also, if your meter is behind a locked gate or you have a pet in the area, please make sure our technician can get to your meter when it is due to be read. (See the date range for your next meter reading on the top-right portion of your bill.)



Meters must be accessible between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, but we prefer 24/7 access in case there are other off-hour times when we need access to, for example, make repairs, respond to an emergency or correct a safety hazard.

GET PLUGGED IN TO ELECTRIC SAFETY



It's hard to imagine life without electricity. It's an extremely safe and reliable source of energy – when used properly. But it also demands our respect. Failure to heed certain

warnings and guidelines could lead to serious consequences, including fires and/or injuries to you or your family.

Now that you'll be spending more time inside with the onset of colder weather, here are a few indoor electric safety tips.

- Don't mix electricity and water Never touch anything using electricity (appliances, light switches, etc.) if your hands are wet or you're standing on a wet surface. You could suffer a shock or a serious injury.
- Don't fall in love with extension cords Overloading an extension cord or connecting multiple extension cords can

lead to overheating and a fire. And, for the same reason, never run an extension cord under a carpet or rug.

- **Don't be a yanker -** Yanking an electrical cord from the wall can damage the plug and the outlet. Pull the cord out by the plug.
- **Do replace damaged cords** Check your electrical cords for worn spots or frayed wires. Replace them if you find any damage. Homemade repairs can cause fires.
- **Do be cautious with flammable materials –** Be sure to keep them away from lamps and heaters.
- **Do protect children** Install safety covers on unused outlets to keep small children from playing with them.

To ensure a safe and happy experience – especially with so many of us decorating for the holidays – it's important to keep these and other tips in mind. For example, **do not** connect more outdoor light strands together than recommended by the manufacturer.


